COURSE INTRODUCTION

The undergraduate program of Political Science at Kumaun University aims to provide students with a conceptual foundation in the discipline, with an ability to critically analyze the omnipresence of the "political." Through various courses we shall examine the nature, distribution and dynamics of power – both at the macro level of national and international politics and also at the micro level of the individual, family and community. We will map the ways in which knowledge systems and challenges to particular power relations have been constructed over specific vectors of time and space. We will study Aristotle and Plato, Gandhi and Iqbal; complementing studies on Cold War politics will be an exploration of party politics in South Asia. The relationship of theory and ethnography, quantitative and qualitative techniques, analysis of objective data and descriptive accounts will provide the background to our studies. Exploration of the 'field' and 'data collection' will be of vital importance as we seek to prepare a strong foundation in research methodology. Following Kumaun University's aim of covering the breadth of disciplines and exploring their interconnections, a student of Political Science will be encouraged to identify and pursue areas of interest that go beyond conventional disciplinary structures.
